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3 Branches of trees



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Definition (Hyperplane Arrangement)

A hyperplane arrangement is a finite set \mathcal{A} of affine hyperplanes in \mathbb{R}^n .

Definition (Region)

A region (or chamber) of an arrangement \mathcal{A} is a connected component of

$$\mathbb{R}^n\setminus\bigcup_{H\in\mathcal{A}}H.$$

The number of regions is denoted by r(A).



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• Any hyperplane in \mathbb{R}^n is of the form:

$$H = \{(x_1,\ldots,x_n) \in \mathbb{R}^n \mid a_1x_1 + \cdots + a_nx_n = c\}.$$

• Defining polynomial of *H*:

$$P_H = a_1 x_1 + \cdots + a_n x_n - c.$$

 Any region of A is an intersection of half-spaces of the form P_H > 0 or P_H < 0 for each H ∈ A.

Characteristic polynomial

- L_A is the poset of non-empty intersections of hyperplanes in A ordered by reverse inclusion.
- The möbius function $\mu: L_{\mathcal{A}} \to \mathbb{Z}$ is defined as:

$$\mu(x) = \begin{cases} 1, & \text{if } x = \mathbb{R}^n \\ -\sum\limits_{y < x} \mu(y), & \text{otherwise.} \end{cases}$$

• The characteristic polynomial of \mathcal{A} is defined as:

$$\chi_{\mathcal{A}}(t) = \sum_{x \in L_{\mathcal{A}}} \mu(x) t^{\dim(x)}.$$

Examples



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Theorem

For any arrangement \mathcal{A} in \mathbb{R}^n , the characteristic polynomial is of the form

$$\chi_{\mathcal{A}}(t) = \sum_{i=0}^{n} (-1)^{n-i} c_i t^i$$

where $c_i \in \mathbb{Z}_{\geq 0}$ for all $0 \leq i \leq n$.

Theorem (Zaslavsky, 1975)

Let \mathcal{A} be an arrangement in \mathbb{R}^n . Then,

$$r(\mathcal{A}) = (-1)^n \chi_{\mathcal{A}}(-1)$$
$$= \sum_{i=0}^n c_i.$$

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Examples



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• Let \mathcal{A} be an arrangement in \mathbb{R}^n and $\chi_{\mathcal{A}}(t) = \sum_{i=0}^n (-1)^{n-i} c_i t^i$.

• By Zaslavsky's theorem,
$$r(\mathcal{A}) = \sum_{i=0}^{n} c_i$$
.

Question

When the regions of an arrangement are in bijection with a combinatorially defined set, is there a *statistic* on the set that induces this breakup?

Definition (Statistic)

A statistic on a set of combinatorial objects \mathcal{O} is a map $f: \mathcal{O} \to \mathbb{Z}_{\geq 0}$.

Definition (Distribution)

The distribution induced by a statistic f on O is the sequence given by

$$c_i = |f^{-1}(i)|$$
 for all $i \in \mathbb{Z}_{\geq 0}$.

In particular, we have

$$\mathcal{O}|=\sum_{i\geq 0}c_i.$$

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Braid arrangement

•
$$A_n = \{x_i = x_j \mid 1 \le i < j \le n\}.$$

• Regions $\leftrightarrow \mathfrak{S}_n$.

•
$$\chi_{\mathcal{A}_n}(t) = \sum_{i=0}^n s(n,i)t^i$$
.

• Coefficients count permutations according to number of cycles.



Figure: A_3 on $x_1 + x_2 + x_3 = 0$.





3 Branches of trees



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Arrangement \mathscr{C}_n in \mathbb{R}^n defined as:

$$\{x_i = x_j, x_i = x_j + 1 \mid i, j \in [n], i \neq j\}.$$

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Specifying a region is same as specifying a valid total order on

$$x_1,\ldots,x_n,x_1+1,\ldots,x_n+1.$$

Example

 $x_2 < x_1 < x_2 + 1 < x_1 + 1 < x_4 < x_4 + 1 < x_3 < x_3 + 1$

represents a region of \mathcal{C}_4 .

Valid: • $x_i < x_i + 1$ • $x_i < x_j \Rightarrow x_i + 1 < x_j + 1$.

$x_2 < x_2 + 1 < x_3 < x_1 < x_3 + 1 < x_1 + 1$





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Arrangement $\mathscr{C}_n^{(m)}$ in \mathbb{R}^n defined as:

$$\{x_i = x_j + k \mid i, j \in [n], i \neq j, k \in [0, m]\}.$$

Regions: Valid total orders on

$$x_1,\ldots,x_n,x_1+1,\ldots,x_n+1,\ldots,x_1+m,\ldots,x_n+m.$$

An (m+1)-ary tree with *n* nodes labeled distinctly using [n].



Theorem (Athanasiadis, 1996)

The characteristic polynomial of $\mathscr{C}_n^{(m)}$ is given by

$$\chi_{\mathscr{C}_{n}^{(m)}}(t) = t(t - mn - 1)(t - mn - 2) \cdots (t - mn - (n - 1)).$$

Corollary

The number of regions of $\mathscr{C}_n^{(m)}$ is given by

$$r(\mathscr{C}_n^{(m)}) = \frac{n!}{mn+1} \binom{(m+1)n}{n}.$$

Definition (n^{th} *m*-Catalan number)

The number of unlabeled (m + 1)-ary trees with *n* nodes given by

$$\frac{1}{mn+1}\binom{(m+1)n}{n}$$



Many other interpretations. Over 200 in the case m = 1!









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Exponential structures: Graphs







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Connected components



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Exponential structures

- For any finite set V, S(V) is the set of S-structures on V.
- $S_c(V) \subseteq S(V)$ is the set of "connected" S-structures on V.

S-structure on label set V

 $\begin{array}{c} \updownarrow \\ \mathsf{Partition of } V: \{B_1, B_2, \dots, B_k\} \\ + \end{array}$

Connected S-structure on each B_i .

For any $n, k \geq 0$,

$$s(n) =$$
 Number of S-structures on $[n]$
 $s_k(n) =$ Number of S-structures on $[n]$ with k "components"

Theorem (Stanely, EC2)

We have the equality of formal power series:

$$\sum_{n,k\geq 0} s_k(n) t^k \frac{x^n}{n!} = \left(\sum_{n\geq 0} s(n) \frac{x^n}{n!}\right)^t.$$

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Find a statistic on the labeled (m + 1)-ary trees with n nodes whose distribution is given by the coefficients of $\chi_{\mathscr{C}_n^{(m)}}$.

Characteristic polynomial and region count

Recall

For any $m, n \geq 1$,

•
$$\chi_{\mathscr{C}_n^{(m)}}(t) = t(t - mn - 1)(t - mn - 2) \cdots (t - mn - (n - 1))$$

•
$$r(\mathscr{C}_n^{(m)}) = \frac{n!}{mn+1} \binom{(m+1)n}{n}.$$

Theorem (Stanley, 1995)

For any $m \ge 1$, we have

$$\sum_{n\geq 0}\chi_{\mathscr{C}_n^{(m)}}(t)\frac{x^n}{n!} = \left(\sum_{n\geq 0}(-1)^n r(\mathscr{C}_n^{(m)})\frac{x^n}{n!}\right)^{-t}.$$

C(m, n, k) = absolute value of the coefficient of t^k in χ_{𝔅^(m)_n}(t).

We have

$$\sum_{n,k\geq 0} C(m,n,k)t^k \frac{x^n}{n!} = \left(\sum_{n\geq 0} r(\mathscr{C}_n^{(m)}) \frac{x^n}{n!}\right)^t.$$

• Show (m + 1)-ary tree structure is exponential, then C(m, n, k) is number of trees with k components.

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Example 2



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Definition

Let V be a finite set of positive integers. $\mathcal{T}^{(m)}(V)$ is the set of (m+1)-ary trees with |V| nodes labeled distinctly using V.

Trees in $\mathcal{T}^{(m)}(V)$ break up into branches just as before.

Connected (m + 1)-ary trees

Definition

Connected trees in $\mathcal{T}^{(m)}(V)$ are those where

- there is only one branch, or equivalently
- last node on the trunk is the largest.



Theorem

C(m, n, k) is the number of trees in $\mathcal{T}^{(m)}([n])$ with k branches.

To prove:

- The branches break a tree into connected trees.
- A tree can be reconstructed from its branches.



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Which first?



Which first? The one which has the largest trunk label.

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• The *m*-Catalan arrangement in \mathbb{R}^n is

$$\mathscr{C}_n^{(m)} := \{ x_i = x_j + k \mid i, j \in [n], i \neq j, k \in [0, m] \}.$$

• The regions of $\mathscr{C}_n^{(m)}$ correspond to the trees in $\mathcal{T}^{(m)}([n])$.

The absolute value of the coefficient of t^k in χ_{C_n}^(m)(t) counts the trees in T^(m)([n]) with k branch nodes.

Recall

C(m, n, k) is the number of trees in $\mathcal{T}^{(m)}([n])$ with k branches.

Result

- $C(m, n, k) \leq C(m+1, n, k)$
- 2 $C(m, n, k) \leq C(m, n+1, k)$
- **3** $C(m, n, k) \ge C(m, n, k+1)$

1. $C(m, n, k) \leq C(m + 1, n, k)$

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Theorem

There are more connected trees in $\mathcal{T}^{(m)}([n])$ than disconnected trees.

• More trees with only one branch than those with more than one.

• Equivalent to
$$C(m, n, 1) \ge \sum_{k=2}^{n} C(m, n, k)$$
.

• Implies $C(m, n, 1) \ge C(m, n, 2) \ge C(m, n, 3) \ge \cdots$.

Theorem

More graphs are connected than disconnected for any vertex set V.



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3 Branches of trees



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Stanley's question

(26) [5–] Let

$$\chi_{\mathfrak{T}_n}(t) = t^n - a_{n-1}t^{n-1} + \dots + (-1)^n a_0.$$

For instance,

$$\begin{split} \chi \tau_3(t) &= t^3 - 3t^2 + 3t - 1 \\ \chi \tau_4(t) &= t^4 - 6t^3 + 15t^2 - 17t + 7 \\ \chi \tau_5(t) &= t^5 - 10t^4 + 45t^3 - 105t^2 + 120t - 51. \end{split}$$

By Exercise 25(a), $a_0 + a_1 + \cdots + a_{n-1} + 1$ is the number of threshold graphs on the vertex set [n]. Give a combinatorial interpretation of the numbers a_i as the number of threshold graphs with a certain property.

Figure: Exercise 5.26 of Stanley's notes.

Theorem (Deshpande, M., Singh)

The coefficient a_k is the number of threshold graphs with k "odd anchors".

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Definition

Arrangements whose hyperplanes are parallel to some braid hyperplane, *i.e.*, of the form

$$x_i = x_j + k$$
 for some $k \in \mathbb{Z}$.

ABSTRACT. We establish general counting formulas and bijections for deformations of the braid arrangement. Precisely, we consider real hyperplane arrangements such that all the hyperplanes are of the form $x_i - x_j = s$ for some integer s. Classical examples include the braid, Catalan, Shi, semiorder and Linial arrangements, as well as graphical arrangements. We express the number of regions of any such arrangements as a signed count of decorated plane trees. The characteristic and coboundary polynomials of these arrangements also have simple expressions in terms of these trees.

We then focus on certain "well-behaved" deformations of the braid arrangement that we call *transitive*. This includes the Catalan, Shi, semiorder and Linial arrangements, as well as many other arrangements appearing in the literature. For any transitive deformation of the braid arrangement we establish a simple bijection between regions of the arrangement and a set of labeled plane trees defined by local conditions. This answers a question of Gessel.

• Catalan arrangement

$$\mathscr{C}_n = \{x_i = x_j, x_i = x_j + 1 \mid i, j \in [n], i \neq j\}.$$

• Shi arrangement

$$S_n = \{x_i = x_j, x_i = x_j + 1 \mid 1 \le i < j \le n\}.$$

• Linial arrangement

$$\mathscr{L}_n = \{x_i = x_j + 1 \mid 1 \le i < j \le n\}.$$

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The characteristic polynomial of \mathscr{L}_3 is $t^3 - 3t^2 + 3t$.

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Image: A matrix and a matrix

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Raney numbers

$$A_n(m,r) := \frac{r}{n(m+1)+r} \binom{n(m+1)+r}{n}$$

• Counts r-tuples of (m + 1)-ary trees with total number of nodes n.

• Setting r = 1 gives us Fuss-Catalan numbers.

Question

Is there a family of arrangements with region numbers $n! \times A_n(m, r)$? If so, what is a corresponding statistic on *r*-tuples of trees?

- For r = 1, $\mathscr{C}_n^{(m)}$ and branch statistic.
- (Deshpande, M., Sarkar) For r = 2,

 $\mathcal{A}_n^{(m)} := \{x_i = 0 \mid i \in [n]\} \cup \{x_i = 2^k x_j \mid k \in [-m, m], 1 \le i < j \le n\}$

and branch statistic on first tree of 2-tuple.

• For *r* > 2?
